3. Leni Riefenstahl

Helene Bertha Amalie Riefenstahl was born in Berlin on 22 August 1902.

She is best known for her propaganda films, most notably *Triumph of the Will,* which she made for Hitler's Nazi Party.

Today, this infamy overshadows her brilliance as a cinematographer.

1. Julian of Norwich (aka Juliana...)

Born in 1342 – probably in Norwich – this anchoress and mystic wrote Revelations of Divine Love in the wake of a series of visions.

This is believed to be the first book written by a woman in English to have been published. It wasn't published until 1670.

2. Ada Lovelace

Ada Lovelace, born in 1815 and daughter of Romantic poet Lord Byron, is considered to be the first computer programmer.

Mathematician Ada is known for her work on Charles Babbage's Analytical Engine.
